One of the key community and economic outcomes during the construction period of the Stage Two Mooloolaba Foreshore project is the continuation of events within the Mooloolaba precinct.

Please see below the anticipated Council's sponsored Major Events and additional annual community events that might be affected by the proposed Stage Two construction period. Please provide a brief summary on the Transport Network Safety Plan.

Response:

Please note the follow key points:

- The Transport Network Safety Plan is one of five (5) plans that support the delivery of the Integrated Transport Strategy. The Network Safety Plan provides the framework for improving transport safety across the Sunshine Coast local government area. The Plan ensures that planning and management for the transport system is current, consistent and coordinated.
- The current Road Safety Plan 2016-2020 (Old Plan) is due for renewal, it became apparent in 2023 that the Old Plan is vehicle driver centric, inward focused and outdated.
- Rather that rinse and repeat the Old Plan, we started with a fresh approach seeking a whole
 of network approach with all modes and abilities to work with all stakeholders to influence
 better safety outcomes. We also decided to engage with the Sunshine Coast Active Transport
 Advocates (SCATAC). Both the new approach and consultation delayed the project from the
 original program in 2023 but has delivered a step improvement, supported by the
 harmonisation with the National and State based approaches.

The Network Safety Plan 2024-2028 is proposed to be a 5 Year Plan with annual reporting for review by the Chief Executive Officer.
